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


Country Context Chad




- Landlocked country in north-central Africa
- Population: 17 mio people (2023)
- Area: 1 284 000 mio km²
- One of the poorest economies in the world
- Land tenure dualism
- Challenges to provide tenure security
- Land conflicts
- Non-transparent and costly land registration processes
- < 10% cadastral coverage

LAND at scale project: Improvement of local land governance in Chad / Amélioration de la gouvernance foncière locale du Tchad

- Project duration: JAN 2024 – JAN 2027
- Project budget: € 2,3 million
- Donor: RVO, LAND at Scale Program
- Implementing partner(s): Oxfam, Kadaster International, FAO
- Main objectives:
 - Raising awareness on regulatory frameworks
 - Strengthening institutional capacity
 - Testing and piloting FFPLA
 - Informing the land reform process



WEAKNESSES

- Communication issues
- Leadership inefficiencies
- Time constraints
- Cultural and language barriers

OPPORTUNITIES

- Ressource availabilities
- Demand for project implementation
- Experience sharing
- Local visibility and credibility

THREATS

- Political changes
- Misunderstandings
- Lack of project support from beneficiaries
- Decision-making processes

Collaboration at different levels: Project consortium – SWOT ANALYSIS (n=10)

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Collaboration at different levels: Project implementation (FFPLA pilots)

- Create a strong foundation for collaborative action (time!)
- Visioning, storytelling, advocacy
- FFPLA according to local needs and requirements
- Emphasis on CO-DESIGN and CO-DEVELOPMENT of processes and approaches
- Create engaging and inspiring environments – facilitate interaction

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Collaboration at different levels: Country context

- Stakeholder mapping and power analysis
- Overcome institutional silos and barriers (Ministry of Finance and the Ministry for Spatial Planning, Housing and Urban Development)
- Foster collaboration with private sector, academia, CSOs and NGOs
- Awareness raising and advocacy campaigns (vulnerable groups)


