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

Spence *Named to recognise two eminent Australians*

William Guthrie Spence (1846–1926)
Miner, union organiser, labour leader and politician

Born in Scotland, Spence came to Victoria as a child during the 1850s gold rush. Working as a miner, he joined the local miner's union and became known as the 'Father' of the Australian Workers' Union. A prominent labour movement leader, he was elected to the first Commonwealth Parliament in 1901. He was Commonwealth Postmaster-General during 1914–1915 and vice-president of the Executive Council in 1916–1917.

Catherine Helen Spence (1825–1910)
Social and political reformer, journalist, feminist, educationist, novelist and writer

Catherine Helen Spence was Australia's first female political candidate, a lifelong campaigner for electoral reform and an acclaimed early novelist. Her influence as a crusading journalist on cultural, political and economic issues, including suffrage, contributed to South Australia being the first Australian colony to grant the vote to women. Spence actively campaigned for proportional representation and toured internationally to widespread acclaim.



The suburb of Spence was named in 1972 to recognise William Guthrie Spence and was amended in 2023 to commemorate the legacy of Catherine Helen Spence.


Public Place Names Act 1989

Act to provide for the naming of divisions and public places

Extract:


- (2) If the Minister is making a determination about the naming of a division, or the naming of a public place after a person mentioned in section 4 (2) (a) or (b), the Minister must consider—
- (a) the number of women and men after whom divisions or public places have been named in the last 10 years; and
 - (b) whether the names of women are well-represented.






ACT SUBURB OF DENMAN PROSPECT



Gazetted Commemorative Place Names: 2024




Commemorative names recognising women

- In situ QR Codes linking physical commemorations to digital stories.







HerStory – how it all started

Background:

- Gender Equality Act 2020
- Put Her Name On It campaign (local government audit)
- Changes to Naming Rules for Places in Victoria (2022)
- Internal discussions began about gender equality in place-naming and commemoration

HerStory and International Women's Day 2024:

- The 'HerStory' map was launched on IWD 2024 (printed and online)
- 'HerStory' celebrates the inspiring, diverse women who are commemorated in Port Phillip
- And importantly, calls for more women to be commemorated going forward
- There are 22 women recognised on the map
- Some of the women are well-known, others relatively unknown and their stories were harder to find
- They include politicians, activists, educators, artists, community organisers and leaders, nurses, athletes and a saint
- Most are individual women. There are some groups of women who achieved great things together
- Most of the women were local, with significant ties to Port Phillip
- There are 4 First Nations women commemorated on the map
- 'HerStory' was a collective effort, drawing on the knowledge, expertise and passion of many people



Challenges and conclusion

- "Great men" – reframe naming practices to include women
- Public nominations are male dominated – educate
- Space and place for non-binary persons – new approaches
